Purpose

- 1. You are scheduled to visit Otago Polytechnic on Friday 16 November 2018.
- 2. We recommend that this event backgrounder is proactively released with information about Otago Polytechnic's risk rating on the TEC's financial monitoring framework withheld.

About Otago Polytechnic

- 3. General information about Otago Polytechnic is attached as Appendix 1. This A3 summary sheet includes a short narrative; delivery enrolment, site and demographic data; financials; and educational performance indicator (EPI) information.
- 4. A biography of the Chief Executive and Council Chair of Otago Polytechnic is included as Appendix 2.
- 5. Otago Polytechnic's funding compared with delivery for 2017 is included in Appendix 3.
- 6. Otago Polytechnic's funding for 2018 is included in Appendix 4.

Regional ITP Roadmap engagement at Otago Polytechnic

7. In October, TEC met with the Otago Polytechnic Council, the senior leadership team, a large group of staff, students and community members at a regional ITP Roadmap workshop in Dunedin. Otago Polytechnic leadership are committed to Otago Polytechnic remaining responsive to its community across the Otago region, and to continuing its strong delivery history.

Otago Polytechnic has increasing demand for higher level delivery

- 8. Otago Polytechnic's Student Achievement Component (SAC) level three and above funding was increased in-year twice in 2018:
 - a. \$379,120 for a collaborative programme to support the delivery of a new *NZ Diploma in Building Surveying*, designed to meet the needs of Councils around NZ for qualified building inspectors; and
 - b. \$2,455,334 to reflect increased demand from industry and learners, including demand for Otago Polytechnic's 'Capable NZ' recognition of prior learning offering (<u>http://capable.nz</u>).

Otago Polytechnic is strongly committed to delivery innovation

- 9. Otago Polytechnic is leading delivery in micro-credentials with its EduBits offering (https://edubits.nz).
- 10. It is also embarking on significant building development projects across its Dunedin and Cromwell campuses, to ensure provision of the best possible learning environments for students into the future. A new, purpose-built training brewery will be opened in Cromwell on 1 December 2018.
- 11. Otago Polytechnic's new student accommodation, Te Pā Tauira, is purpose built and award winning. It reflects the ITP's approach to providing excellent facilities for its students.

12. Otago Polytechnic is likely to ask you about your decisions on the ITP Roadmap 2020 project and about the Ministry of Education's Vocational Education and Training review.

Questions you may like to ask

13. Otago Polytechnic is currently exploring several opportunities to better meet the needs of local industries through both their diploma level offerings and new EduBits micro-credentials. You may like to ask them about these initiatives (e.g. a diploma in heavy vehicle servicing; EduBits training for Air New Zealand).

TEI PROFILE: Otago Polytechnic

Chair: Kathy Grant

Chief Executive: Phil Ker

Key narrative: Otago Polytechnic is a category 1 EER provider and one of only two ITPs currently on a 3 year Plan. Major provision is in the health professions; applied management; fine arts; design; veterinary nursing and animal care; and IT. Otago Polytechnic recently developed a new micro-credential programme called EduBits, with NZQA including the ITP in a pilot to test and evaluate micro-credentials for New Zealand. In late 2015, Otago Polytechnic acquired Aoraki Polytechnic's Dunedin operation subsequent to its merger with CPIT.




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
Net surplus over time

Kathy Grant <i>Chair</i>	Kathy Grant was appointed by the Minister of Tertiary Education to chair the Council from 1 May 2010, having previously been a member of the University of Otago Council and chair of the Council of the Dunedin College of Education. Kathy is also a director of Dunedin City Holdings Limited, deputy chair of Sport Otago and a Board member of the Dunedin Sinfonia. In 2015, the Minister of Health appointed Kathy as Commissioner of Southern District Health Board following the disestablishment of the Board. Her "day job" is as a solicitor in the legal practice of Gallaway Cook Allan. Kathy is an Otago person, born and bred and has lived in Dunedin since the 1970's when she was a University student. When not at work, she enjoys the challenge of rural living.	
Phil Ker	 Phil took up his appointment as Chief Executive of Otago Polytechnic in 2004. Prior to being appointed as Otago Polytechnic Chief Executive, Phil was Executive Director of Corporate Services at Auckland University of Technology. His long standing interest in business education includes past membership of the New Zealand Qualifications Authority (NZQA) National Advisory Committee for Business Studies and the Business Management Advisory Steering Group. Phil's qualifications include Management and Leadership in 	
Chief Executive	Education, Harvard University; MEd (Administration) - First Class Honours at Massey University; Bachelor of Commerce at the University of Auckland; and a Diploma in Teaching from Auckland College of Education. Phil's particular interest is in business education, education for sustainability, staff development generally and leadership development specifically; and in the recognition of prior experiential learning.
