

Event backgrounder: Meeting with UCOL on 5 June 2019

Purpose

- You are scheduled to meet with Universal College of Learning (UCOL) on Wednesday 5 June 2019 at 10.00am – 10.30am to discuss the Reform of Vocational Education (ROVE). You will be meeting with the Chief Executive of UCOL, Dr Amanda Lynn, and the Chair, Ben Vanderkolk. A biography of Dr Lynn and Mr Vanderkolk is attached in Appendix 3.
- 2. General information about UCOL is attached as Appendix 1. The A3 summary sheet includes a short narrative; delivery enrolment, site and demographic data; financial commentary and educational performance indicator (EPI) information for the 2017 year.
- UCOL delivery information in Appendix 1 has not been updated for the 2018 delivery year yet, as the single data return for 2018 has not yet been provided but will be shortly. However, an indicative view of UCOL's Student Achievement Component (SAC) and Youth Guarantee (YG) funding compared with delivery for 2018 is included in Appendix 2.
- 4. UCOL's funding for 2019 is included in Appendix 4.
- 5. We recommend that this backgrounder be released with financial information withheld after meeting with UCOL.

ROVE consultation at UCOL

- Stakeholder mapping information for the ROVE consultation at UCOL is included as Appendix 5.
- UCOL's Chief Executive Dr Amanda Lynn has expressed confidence in UCOL's ability to engage in the reform process, referencing a desire to see a structure and funding system that enables learner-centric organisations.
- 8. UCOL's Chairman Ben Vanderkolk has also welcomed the reform process as enabling opportunities for both student and industry.

UCOL focus areas

- UCOL is a regional ITP, established in 1902, that serves a large part of the lower North Island. The majority of services are provided at four campuses, located in the Manawatu, Whanganui, Wairarapa and Horowhenua regions.
- 10. UCOL is in a stable financial position, and has its own sustainability strategy, which incorporates financial as well as educational and operational initiatives.



12. UCOL has submitted a supplementary Investment Plan document to the TEC, focusing on the establishment of Centres of Vocational Excellence (COVEs) at UCOL. TEC encouraged UCOL to provide its feedback on COVEs to the ROVE project during the consultation period.

Partnerships

- 13. UCOL has a partnership with Heytour Group Holdings to promote UCOL's programmes in China. UCOL plans to expand its offshore delivery and is also looking to set up a partnership with Saigon Tech in Vietnam.
- 14. UCOL is a key partner in Māori and Pasifika Trades Training with the *Te Puna Mātauranga o Whanganui* consortium. The consortium contributes to the Manawatu-Whanganui Regional Growth Study and *Te Pae Tawhiti*, the Māori Economic Development Plan for Manawatu/Whanganui. While coverage was focused in Whanganui initially, *Te Puna Matauranga o Whanganui* now operates through campuses in Whanganui, Wairarapa, Manawatu and Horowhenua.
- 15. UCOL partners with the Department of Corrections to deliver in prisons. Graham Lowe's "Kick for the Seagulls" initiative will be taught by UCOL at Manawatu Prison.



Total On-plan SAC and YG funding for UCOL for 2019 is **\$26,413,320**. This is an increase of \$182,423 (or 0.70%) over UCOL's indicative 2018 SAC and YG delivery of \$26,230,897. A fuller breakdown of 2019 funding is outlined in Appendix 4.

Ben Vanderkolk, Chair



Ben Vanderkolk has been Crown Solicitor in Palmerston North since 1987 and practises in criminal and private and commercial litigation. Ben has been a member of the Law Practitioners Disciplinary Tribunal and of the Faculty of the NZ Law Society Litigation Skills Programme. Ben's interest in the community, the region and his Netherlands heritage has led him to undertake other governance roles. He has served as Chair of the NZ Netherlands Foundation, is Chair of the Te Awahou-Nieuwe Stroom Trust, and has served as Chair of the Manfeild Park Trust. Ben has lived in Palmerston North since 1983; he has been a member of the UCOL council since 2013 and was appointed as Chair in 2018.

Dr Lynn was appointed Chief Executive of UCOL in 2018. She has extensive experience working closely with iwi, communities, businesses, industry groups, local and central government, internationally, and with tertiary institutes. Dr Lynn has a Doctor of Philosophy (PhD), focusing on innovation, entrepreneurship and economic development, awarded by Massey University in 2016.
