# Purpose

- You are scheduled to visit with University of Otago (Wellington) (UoW) 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> year Medical students on Thursday, 19 August 2021 from 2.00 – 3.00pm at the Horn Lecture Theatre, Level 12, Ward Support Block, Wellington Hospital, Newtown.
- This backgrounder provides you with an overview of the UoW campus (Te Whāre Wānanga o Ōtago ki Pōneke), including courses and programmes offered; and the UoW Pacific Office's purpose and role. The Ministry of Health will be providing you with a speech for this event.
- The Event Information Sheet is included as Appendix 1 (with the caveat that the noted venue in the sheet is now incorrect). The UoW medical student class (draft) programme is attached as Appendix 2.

# About the University of Otago (Wellington) campus

- 4. UoW is located on a tertiary hospital campus. Many of the teaching and research staff hold joint positions with local hospitals, bringing close clinical links, collaboration and exchange of knowledge with the region's health service providers. Others are embedded in the local community, providing strong links to primary care, including Māori health providers Ora Toa and Kokiri Marae.
- 5. Many of UoW's more than 1,000 students have worked in health and other disciplines for a number of years, while others are recent university graduates. This creates an environment focussed on learning from the experiences of others, whether a student chooses a programme taught on campus or online.

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## Undergraduate study

- 6. UoW offers the following qualifications for undergraduate students:
  - Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery (MB ChB) The Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery (MB ChB) degree is commonly referred to as the 'medical degree'. School leavers enrol in Dunedin for the competitive Health Sciences First Year course. They then apply for admission to 2nd-year medicine in Dunedin.

After studying for three years in Dunedin, one-third of medical students move to UoW for their 4th, 5th, and 6th years.

• *Bachelor of Radiation Therapy* – The Bachelor of Radiation Therapy is a three year full time programme only available at UoW.

#### Postgraduate study

- 7. Some papers available through UoW focus on specific disciplines, whereas others are interdisciplinary, covering a range of professional areas. Study options for postgraduate students include:
  - Bachelor of Biomedical Sciences with Honours (BBiomedSc(Hons))
  - Master of Biomedical Sciences (MBiomedSc)
  - Obstetrics, Gynaecology and Women's Health Postgraduate programmes
  - Occupational and Aviation Medicine Unit Postgraduate programmes
  - Primary Health Care and General Practice Postgraduate programmes
  - Psychological Medicine Postgraduate programmes
  - Public Health Postgraduate programmes
  - Radiation Therapy Postgraduate Programmes
  - Rehabilitation Teaching and Research Unit Postgraduate programmes
  - Surgery and Anaesthesia Postgraduate programmes

#### The Pacific Office

- 8. The Pacific Office provides support and expertise to those researching Pacific health in Aotearoa and the Pacific region.
- 9. The University of Otago's Pacific Strategic Framework (2013-2020), forms a guide for Pacific related activities and is comprised of six goals:
  - Goal 1 Demonstrating and valuing leadership on Pacific matters
  - Goal 2 Encouraging Pacific Research Excellence
  - Goal 3 Strengthening Community Engagement
  - Goal 4 Promoting Growth and Development
  - Goal 5 Encouraging Pacific Curricula
  - Goal 6 Contributing to the Pacific Region and International Progress
- 10. These overarching goals are supported, in turn, by strategies and planned activities articulated in the University of Otago, Wellington Pacific Action Plan.

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- 11. The UoW Pacific Office is focused on supporting Pacific students with their studies with an emphasis on recruitment, retention and the successful completion of selected study courses and programmes. UoW is also seeking to increase the numbers of Pacific staff members and support their professional development, in addition to encouraging stronger links with Pacific communities within New Zealand, and extending further into the Pacific Region and beyond.
- 12. High quality research that demonstrates clinical relevance and contributes towards improved health outcomes for Pacific communities is prioritised at UoW. The knowledge translation and dissemination activities associated with research work are of importance to Wellington based researchers and teams who work in partnership with Pacific communities within New Zealand and in the Pacific Region.
